TO THE PUBLIC.

The East Carolina Fish, Oyster, Game and Industrial Association have the honor to announce that they will hold their Seventh Annual Fair at their grounds in New-Berne, N. C., on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday, February 19th, 20th, 21st, 22nd, 23rd and 24th, 1894.

They offer, for progress in all the branches of industry and art, liberal premiums.

The following arrangements for the transportation to and from the city of all articles and animals entered for exhibition have been made with the Railroad and Steamboat Companies:

All articles intended for exhibition at the Fair will be transported upon pre-payment of freight at regular rates, and receipted bill will be given to shipper by R. R. Agt., specifying articles in detail and charges on each article. This receipted bill, accompanied by certificate from Secretary of the Fair Association that the articles specified were exhibited at the Fair, will entitle the original shipper of such articles to free transportation of them back to the original shipping point.

The above does not apply to race horses. No certificate of exhibit will be given race horses.

The committee will take every precaution in its power to secure the safety of all articles and stock, after arrival and arrangements for exhibition, but will not be responsible for any loss or damage that may occur.

The grounds are nicely located and easily reached, being directly on the line of the Atlantic & North Carolina, and Wilmington, New-Berne & Norfolk Railroads. Also cabs and carriages from all principal streets in the city.

Hotel and boarding house accommodations are fully up to the requirements of the occasion.

Strenuous efforts will be put forth to make this the most attractive and most successful Fair yet held by the Association.

REGULATIONS.

The President and Directors shall have the general supervision of the Fair.

It shall be the duty of any of these officers to take speedy and efficient means to quell any disturbance that may arise upon the grounds, and to see that proper order is kept. The employees and policemen will obey any one or more of them to accomplish this end.

The President will wear a white rosette; each of the Vice-Presidents, red and white; each of the Directors, blue; the Secretary and Treasurer, red: Managers, green.

JUDGES.

To secure an intelligent and impartial award is the end to be attained by all the machinery of the Fair, and the Judges will be selected with that view, by the Directors.

They will carefully examine all articles in the class to which they are assigned, and give the awards.

If there is no competition the Judges will not award a Premium, unless there is decided merit; and if they find any article on exhibition not mentioned in Premium List, deserving mention, they will report same to the Secretary and he to the Board of Directors.

No competitor can act as Judge, in the class in which he or she exhibits.

Competitors for premiums cannot be present during the examination of the Judges, unless specially requested by them.

ENTRIES.

The Secretary will receive entries at his office and record them in the Entry Book and give the exhibitor a tag for same.

The name of the exhibitor shall not be attached to any article or stock exhibited until the awards have been made by the Judges.

Parties from a distance may ship their goods to the Secretary who will follow their instructions in regard to them and have them exhibited to the best advantage.

All articles entered for Premiums must be upon the grounds on Monday, the 19th day of February.

Every article or animal entered for competition shall be under the control of the Board of Directors.

No premium will be awarded on any exhibit when owner has informed Judges of ownership.

Exhibitors will not be allowed to remove any article or stock until the close of the Fair without the permission of the Directors in charge of Department.

The Treasurer as soon as possible, will pay the successful exhibitors who have been awarded premiums.

All premiums not called for within 30 days after awarded will be considered donated to the Fair.

INVITATION.

The members of the press generally are invited to attend our Fair, and if they will make it known to the Secretary, he will gladly furnish them tickets of admission.

SUGGESTIONS TO EXHIBITORS.

Make your entries early, and take your exhibits to the Grounds at the time designated in the rules, and don't ask to remove them until the close of the Fair.

It is not a wise plan to conclude, before you leave home, that the things you are going to show are so much better than what anyone else will have, that yours will take the premium as a matter of course.

When you are unsuccessful, don't expose your temper or disappointment by loud and angry talk, and uncomplimentary attacks upon the judges. Judges sometimes make mistakes, but they intend to be honest, and their shortcomings, as a rule, are pure and simple errors of judgment. It is often the case that there is not room for decided judgment, and the skill of the best judges is overtaxed to detect differences. A slight point may have weight to turn the decision against you, but still you are really benefitted by the show about as much as though they marked the prize for you, because the public, being aware of close contest, will fairly discriminate and recognize the fact that your animal or article is a superior one, quite an equal match for the prize one, and really good enough for anybody. Under provocacation, better be silent than noisy, because, when you begin to curse the committee, you are advertising your disappointment.

Don't abuse the officers, and make the air blue with pungent remarks and threats that you will never go to that Fair again; that you are going to do what you can to break it up, because you did not get premiums enough. If the officers of the Fair do what they can to get honorable and competent judges, they have done their duty. An intelligent exhibitor will sympathize with the officers, and regret with them the errors of a willful judge, rather than censure them because of his blunders.

Don't growl and grumble about everything that you see, but make allowances for the difficulties of running a big Fair without some misfits. What you can't put up with go to the officers and relate quietly, and it will be remedied.

RULES AND RECULATIONS.

Rule 1.—The New American Standard of Perfection will be the guide of the judges on all varieties for which premiums are offered. And in no case will premiums be awarded where the specimens do not come up to the following scale of

A First Premium bird must score at least 90 points. A Second Premium bird at least 85 points.

Rule 2.—All birds competing for premiums must be strictly the property of the exhibitors. Any attempt to evade this rule in any particular will exclude all specimens entered by the offending party from competing, if discovered in time; if not, all preminms awarded such exhibitors shall be withheld, and any one found violating this rule will be debarred from showing at any future exhibition of the Ass'n,

Rule 3.—Cards showing the entry number must be attached to each coop as soon as placed in position.

Rule 4.—Cards showing in detail the number of "points" allowed to each entry will be attached to all coops of birds entered for competition.

RULE 5.—The term Pair-a male and female.

The term Cock—a male specimen hatched prior to 1893. The term Cockerel—male specimen hatched during 1893. The term Hen—female specimen hatched prior to 1893.
The term Pullet—female specimen hatched during 1893.

Rule 6.—Errors in making entries will bar the specimens from competing, unless corrected by the Secretary before the birds are placed in position. All exhibitors are particularly requested to be careful in making original entries correct, and thereby save the Association time and trouble in changing.

RULE 7.—Exhibitors need not accompany their birds. They can be sent direct to the exhibition hall. All specimens will be promptly returned to their owners at the close of the exhibition, or otherwise disposed of as they may direct.

RULE 8 .- All specimens must be in the hall at 11 o'clock A. M., February 19th, 1894, unless unavoidably delayed, in which case they may be admitted at the discretion of the Advisory Board. Hall will be open for the reception of birds on the morning of February 19th, 1894.

Rule 9.—Premiums on exhibition pens will be awarded in the following manner: The judges will select the four (4) highest scoring females in each variety, owned by one exhibitor, add them together, and divide the amount by four, which will

- 4. Entries for all Races close at 11 o'clock P. M., February 3. One-half of entrance money payable on February 3, and one-half by or before 11 o'clock P. M., February 15th. No attention paid to entries unless accompanied by fee.
- 5. In entering horses, the name, age, sex and color of the animal must be given, with name of sire and dam, if known; also name and residence of owner, accompanied by the last payment, by or before 11 o'clock P. M., February 15, 1894.

- 7. The Society reserves the right to change the programme to meet the casualties of the weather.
