

ANNOUNCEMENT

The East Carolina Fish, Oyster, Game and Industrial Association have the honor to announce that they will hold their Fourteenth Fair and Race Meet at their grounds in New Bern, N. C., on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday, November 12th, 13th, 14th, 15th, 16th and 17th, 1900.

The grounds are nicely located and easily reached, being directly on the line of the Atlantic and North Carolina, and Atlantic Coast Line Railroads.

It is the determination of the management to leave nothing undone to make this coming event greater, grander, more instructive, more pleasant and more enjoyable than any entertainment ever before given by this Association, permitting nothing on the grounds the exhibition of which will cause the slightest offense to any visitor.

Liberal premiums are offered in every department, and the Race Purses are such as will attract the fleetest runners and trotters from this and adjoining States.

The gates will be open for the admission of visitors at 10 o'clock A. M. each day and close at 10 P. M.

The grounds and buildings will be lighted throughout by Electric Lights.

Cheap Excursion Rates over all Railroad and Steamboat Lines.

SPECIAL EXCURSION TRAINS will be run every day during the session of the Fair.

Come and induce your friends and neighbors to do likewise. A good time and a cordial welcome awaits you.

NEW BERN, N.C.

The city of New Bern is situated in a triangle formed by the junction of the Neuse and Trent rivers, and has direct communication, not only with the Atlantic Ocean, but all portions of the State by water and rail, and with every portion of the country via the Wilmington, New Bern and Norfolk Railroad, extending from this city to Wilmington, where it connects with the ocean via the Cape Fear River, and the Atlantic Coast Line and Seaboard Air Line railway system, and the Atlantic and North Carolina, which extends from Morehead City, via New Bern and Goldsboro, where it connects with the Coast Line and Southern systems.

A line of steamers connects with the Norfolk and Southern Railroad to Elizabeth City, on the Pasquotank River, and via that road with the Pennsylvania, Norfolk and Western, Southern and Chesapeake and Ohio systems of railways at Norfolk, and numerous American and European steamship lines. It will be seen that New Bern is, therefore, in no sense isolated from the rest of the world, but on the contrary, is exceptionally well provided with the means of cheap and quick communication.

New Bern is the county seat of Craven County, and has a population of nearly, if not quite 10,000 souls. Its people are law-abiding, industrious and comparatively thrifty. It is known as the "City of Elms," its shelled streets being beautifully shaded with the trees to which it is indebted for that cognomen, and it abounds in pretty situations, attractive and comfortable homes, and driveways into the surrounding country through thrifty truck farms.

REGULATIONS.

The President and Directors shall have the general supervision of the Fair and shall see that order and decorum are observed on the grounds and in the buildings.

It shall be the duty of any of these officers to take speedy and efficient means to quell any disturbance that may arise and the employees and policemen will obey any one or more of them to accomplish this end.

The sale of spirituous, vinous or malt liquors on the grounds or in any of the buildings is absolutely prohibited, nor will any pool selling, gambling devices, lotteries, or games of chance of any kind or description be tolerated or allowed, and any person found engaging in the same will be excluded.

The President will wear a white rosette; each of the Vice-Presidents, red and white; each of the Directors, blue; the Secretary, red; Managers, green.



To secure an intelligent and impartial award is the end to be attained by all the machinery of the Fair, and the Judges will be selected with that view, by the Directors.

They will carefully examine all articles in the class to which they are assigned, and give the awards.

If there is no competition the Judges will not award a Premium, unless there is decided merit; and if they find any article on exhibition not mentioned in Premium List deserving mention they will report same to the Secretary and he to the Board of Directors.

No competitor can act as Judge, in the class in which he or she exhibits.

Competitors for premiums cannot be present during the examination of the Judges.

No premiums will be awarded on any exhibit when owner has informed Judge of ownership.



NOTICE TO EXHIBITORS.

The Secretary will receive entries at his office and record them in the Entry Book and give the exhibitor a tag for same.

All articles entered for Premiums must be upon the grounds on Monday, the 12th day of November, 1900.

Parties from a distance may ship their goods to the Secretary who will follow their instructions in regard to them and have them exhibited to the best advantage.

The name of the exhibitor shall not be attached to any article or stock exhibited until the awards have been made by the Judges.

The committee will take every precaution in its power to secure the safety of all articles and stock after arrival, and arrange same for exhibition, but will not be responsible for any loss or damage that may occur.

The Society makes no charges for space, comfortable stalls for stock, and feed and bedding free.

Every article or animal entered for competition shall be under the control of the Board of Directors.

Exhibitors will not be allowed to remove any article or stock until the close of the Fair without the permission of the director in charge of department.

The following arrangements for the transportation to and from the city of all articles and animals entered for exhibition have been made with the Railroad and Steamboat Companies:

All articles intended for exhibition at the Fair will be transported upon pre-payment of freight at regular rates, and receipted bill will be given to shipper by R. R. Agent, specifying articles in detail and charges on each article. This receipted bill, accompanied by certificate from Secretary of the Fair Association that the articles specified were exhibited at the Fair, will entitle the original shipper of such article to free transportation of them back to the original shipping point. This provision does not apply to race horses.

The Association as soon as possible, will pay the successful exhibitors who have been awarded premiums.

All premiums not called for within 30 days after awarded will be considered donated to the Fair.

PRIVILEGES.

Parties desiring to purchase privileges can do so at any time on application to the Secretary. A cash deposit of 25 per cent. will be required on the sale of each privilege, and the balance must be paid on or before November 12th, 1900, the failure to do which leaves it at the option of the Association to cancel the sale, the purchaser forfeiting the payment already made.

One ticket, good for one admission each day of the Fair, will be given for every \$10.00 of privilege money paid.

INVITATION.

The members of the press generally are cordially invited to attend our Fair, and if they will make it known to the Secretary, he will gladly furnish them tickets of admission.

PRODUCTS OF THE LAND.

There is no part of the Atlantic coast where cereals, grasses, vegetables, fruits, melons, and root crops can be raised more easily and abundantly than in this section. Soils are of great diversity and of every degree of fertility, from the black muck of the drained swamps to the white sand of the beach dunes, and not a stone is to be seen anywhere. Here are stiff lands, producing wheat, corn, berries and fruits of certain kinds; loose lands, yielding peas, peanuts, sweet and Irish potatoes, melons, strawberries, grapes and garden truck in great variety; gray sandy clay, which produces the best cotton; white sandy soil, favoring long straw pine, corn and cotton; clay loam, very fertile; alluvial soils for grasses, grain and roots; also very fertile low, sandy loam, producing grapes and peaches; natural swamp lands, affording cranberries and reeds for cattle fodder; reclaiming lake and swamp lands, producing corn, peas and apples of excellent flavor; peat lands for fertilizer and fuel; white beach sand, yielding Yopon tea, pine and grapes; black vegetable mould, richest of all; and so on, through every grade of admixture and chemical combination. Outcropping of yellow marl and shell rock often protrude from river cuts and elevations.






DISCOUNT DAYS-TUESDAYS AND FRIDAYS.

NEW BERN GRADED SCHOOLS.

New Bern now has an excellent system of Graded Schools. In the white school, there are eleven teachers and a superintendent. The buildings have been recently equipped, and they are now heated by means of warm air furnaces. This system of heating gives the best ventilation known for the school-room, and the heat is evenly distributed throughout the room. The sanitary arrangement is of the best, city water and sewerage being used throughout the buildings.

The course of study covers a period of ten years. Beginning with the most primary, pupils are steadily advanced through a continuous course, the completion of which prepares for college or its equivalent. Thorough instruction is given in Reading, Writing, Spelling, Geography, Mathematics, Language and Composition, Literature, History, Latin and Elementary Science.

Tuition is free to bona fide residents of the city of New Bern. Tuition for those living outside of the city is as follows: Primary, one dollar per month; Intermediate, two dollars; Advanced, three dollars. Good board can be obtained at reasonable rates. New Bern thus offers good advantages to those who wish to educate their children.




Pollock Street, Looking East, New Bern, N. C.

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

DEPARTMENT IV.

E. B. HACKBURN and J. W. STEWART, Directors,

Section I.-HORSES.

General Rules and Regulations governing exhibits in this department.

1.—A premium will not be awarded unless the animal be deemed individually worthy, even though there be no competition.

2.—Applicants entering stock of any kind as pure-bred will be required to farnish the Secretary of the Fair Association at the time of entry with authenticated pedigrees, which will be passed upon by competent committees. These committees will upon proof of pedigree certify that the animal is pure-bred; and such certificate must be handed to the judges awarding premiums; without such certificate no animal shall be exhibited in the ring in the pure-bred classes.

3.—Exhibitors will be required to display over each stall or pen occupied by their stock a placard containing the name, age and breed of animal occupying such stall or pen. In the case of pure-bred animals the placard shall also state the name and registry number of the animal exhibited, together with the name and registry number of both its sire and dam. Placards will be furnished for this purpose on application at the Secretary's office on the fair grounds where they shall be properly filled out.

4.—No animal shall be entitled to space until after proper entry shall have been made; and after such entry for premium no animal shall be removed from the fair grounds until the close of the fair without written permission from the Secretary or the Director in charge of the Department; if otherwise removed the exhibitor shall forfeit all claim to a premium even though such may have previously been awarded.

5.—The same animal may compete for more than one premium except where otherwise stated; but in order to do so such animal must have been entered under each premium number for which it is to compete.

6.—All entries shall be understood to be for the first premium of the premium number under which entry is made; failing to take first the animal shall compete for second premium if such be offered; no animal, however, shall be awarded more than one premium under the same premium number.

7.—All stock will be required to take part in the Grand parade if at any time ordered, except where stock is not able to come out or is too vicious;

such cases of exemption, however, are to be decided by the Director in charge.

8.—From ten A. M. to three P. M. of each day all stock must be uncovered and open to inspection, unless permission to the contrary be given by the Director in charge; and an attendant must be on hand between those hours to answer politely all questions.

 No animal shall be allowed to take more than one first premium at this fair except one special, as one of a pair and as one of a herd.

10.—Proof as to breeding and age of any animal may be required in every case in which the judge or Director in charge are not satisfied as to same.

11.—Comfortable stalls for horses and cattle and pens for sheep, goats and hogs will be furnished free of charge for animals regularly entered in competition. Bedding will be likewise furnished free. Feed will be issued to stock every morning and evening during the fair free of charge, and every care and attention will be shown them; it is desirable, however, that parties exhibiting valuable animals should have their own attendant in special charge.

12.—The Fair Association will have all proper care taken to prevent, but shall not be responsible for damage to or loss of anything entered for exhibition, nor shall they incur any expense therefor.

13.—Applications for stalls or pens should be made as early as possible to the Secretary of the Association who will apportion the same to the best advantage in the order of application.

14.—All exhibitors in the ring must strictly observe the commands of the Director in charge, and the attendants shall be nearly attired.

15.—Exhibitors in this Department will be required to test their animals under the direction of the judge or judges who may have charge of the class under which entry is made; and such judge or judges shall have full power to rule out of competition all who do not comply with their requirements,

The pedigrees of all animals competing as pure-bred under this section must be fully verified and filed with the Secretary of the Association at the time of making the entry. Reference will be made to the English Stud Book, Bruce's American Stud Book, Wallace's Stud Book, the American Trotting Register, Battell's Morgan Register and the National Saddle-Horse Breeders Register.

The age of horses, jacks and mules shall be computed from the 1st

The sanitary arrangement is of the best, city water and sewerage being used throughout the buildings.

The course of study covers a period of ten years. Beginning with the most primary, pupils are steadily advanced through a continuous course, the completion of which prepares for college or its equivalent. Thorough instruction is given in Reading, Writing, Spelling, Geopraphy, Mathematics, Language and Composition, Literature, History, Latin and Elementary Science.

Tuition is free to bona fide residents of the city of New Bern. Tuition for those living outside of the city is as follows: Primary, one dollar per month; Intermediate, two dollars; Advanced, three dollars. Good board can be obtained at reasonable rates. New Bern thus offers good advantages to those who wish to educate their children.

POULTRY, PIGEONS AND PET STOCK.

Note.—All exhibits will be strictly governed by the rules. Please read carefully, as many changes have been made in this Department.

Rule 1.—The American Standard of Perfection will be the guide of the Judges in awarding premiums.

Rule 2.—Unless there are more than two entries in each class first premium money will be withheld, but first honor given. No specimen will be awarded a first prize that does not score 90 points. No premium awarded a specimen scoring less than 85 points.

RULE 3—Competition is open to the world, and all specimens exhibited must be the property of the exhibitor. Any attempt to evade this rule will exclude all specimens entered by offending party from competing.

RULE 4.—For the benefit of beginners we append the recognized terms; Cock, a male specimen hatched prior to 1900; Cockerel, a male specimen hatched during 1900; Hen, a female specimen hatched prior to 1900; Pullet, a female specimen hatched during 1900.

Rule 5. – For best pen consisting of 1 male and 4 females from each variety on which premiums are offered a special premium of \$3.00 will be given, 2d premium \$1.50. No premiums awarded on pens scoring less than 182. There must be more than 2 pens in each class to receive 1st money.

NOTE:—Exhibitors need not accompany their fowls. When addressed to Director Poultry Department, with express or freight charges prepaid, they will receive proper attention and be returned to owners at close of Fair.

Attach numbered leg-bonds to each fowl sent, then the score cards which will be sent with each exhibit will be of service to you.

The Society will feed and coop free all specimens sent, but exhibitors may furnish their own coops if desired.

Make your entries very plain and send early to the Secretary. Do not depend on the Director to make them for you after they arrive.

NO ENTRANCE FEE IS CHARGED.

The Association will not be responsible for loss from any cause whatever, but best of care and attention will be given.


MARKET TRUCK.

No agricultural districts in the United States are worked with more intelligence and profitable outcome than the truck farms around New Bern. Four thousand acres at least are in the highest state of cultivation, with a diversity of products which covers the entire range of the seedman's caralogue. Most truckers produce four different crops from the same acreage every year, aggregating in a good year \$200 to the acre. Cabbage and kale are shipped all winter. Lettuce and radishes go out in February, asparagus in March, and the rest follow. The total annual shipments reach a quarter of a million of packages, of which perhaps 100,000 are Irish potatoes, which are dug early in June. Such is the wonderful character of this industry that, great as it already is, every year seems to add to its marvelous development and expansive area.

The mild weather of the Pamlico Section enables the farmer to work twelve months in the year; it reduces the cost of live stock raising to the minimum, and cattle can find good grazing for a large part of the year, it makes the fuel bills for farmers an inconsiderable item, and it obviates the necessity of heavy clothing and many other expenses absolutely necessary in all cold countries. Thus the Southern farmer's capital not only yields him two dollars for every dollar returned to the Western farmer for his capital, but added to this there is a difference in the cost of living, which is so great that it must command wide attention as it becomes more fully understood.




South side Pollock Street, Looking West, New Bern, N. C.





New Bern, Rear View of Main Building, Fair Grounds,




NEW BERN, N. C.

Is undeniably the leading market in the State, and we may say on the Atlantic Coast, with possibly the exception of Norfolk, for supplies of fish of every palatable variety, oysters, clams, terrapin, etc.

No less than eighty varieties of salt water and fresh water fish have been shown at the New Bern Fair at a single exhibit, all taken from neighborhood waters, and supplemented by nineteen varieties of oysters, and an attractive assortment of clams, crabs, scallops, mussels, terrapins, and crustaceans. Seventy-five thousand packages of fish, packed on ice, go out from New Bern every year. Fully 2,000 persons are employed, and a great number of nets, boats, seines and vessels. Enormous quantities of shad, sea trout or weakfish, red drum, mullets and herring, are caught in fall and spring, with bluefish, Spanish mackerel and various other varieties, more or less valued, at different seasons. Many varieties of fish, anadromous and stationary, spawn in the rivers, creeks and estuaries. Myriads of pelagic fish pass to and fro from the ocean with the diurnal ebb and flood; fluxes which keep the landlocked waters pure, and insure the health and welfare of all who dwell upon their shores.

New Bern and Her Manufacturing Industries.

We can consistently boast of possessing as many manufacturing plants, cotton mills excepted, as any town of our size, and point with a degree of pardonable pride to our many lumber and planing mills, factories for working lumber into specialties, iron works and machine shops, fertilizer factories, knitting mills, packing houses, carriage works, marble and building stone works, ice plant, cotton gins, brick plants, cotton seed oil mill, bottling works, canning factory, basket and barrel factory, etc. etc.

In the city of New Bern, and within sight of its steeples, 13 saw mills are now running, whose joint output of dressed and undressed lumber reaches 70,000,000 ft. per year. Some of these mills have a capacity of 40,000 ft. per day. They have drying kilns and planing mills attached to them, and use all the latest mechanical improvements. Adding several saw mills a little distance from town, the annual shipments must reach 100,000,000 ft. Large tracts of proximate timber of all sorts peculiar to the soil remain uncut and available. These include no less than 80 varieties of furniture and other economic woods, of which rough and polished samples are shown at the New Bern Fair,

A more favored location for manufactories cannot be found in the South. Raw material exists here in abundance. Our supply of timber is adequate to meet the requirements of a dozen wood-working factories, and our agricultural lands, rivers and sounds may be relied upon to furnish canning factories with vegetables and fruits and fish and oysters sufficient to keep them running on full time. A half dozen cotton mills could be operated here with profit, as could be a furniture factory, wood pulp and paper mill, starch factory, and agricultural implement works. Factory sites are cheap, taxation low, labor abundant and cheap, and our shipping facilities all that can reasonably be desired.

Its superior advantages as a shipping point, and the enterprise, energy and public spirit of its citizens and business men of prominence and influence are factors that may be relied upon for commercial progress and general prosperity.

The time of the Fair will be propitious for a visit from prospectors for homes, farms or manufacturing sites.

- 3. In Trotting Races money will be divided—50 per cent. to first horse, 25 per cent. to second, 15 per cent. to third, and 10 per cent. to fourth. In Running Races—50 per cent. to first horse, 30 per cent. to second, 20 per cent. to third.
- 4. Entries for all Races close at 11 o'clock P. M., Nov. 3rd, 1900. No conditional entries will be received, and if sent will be treated as straight entries. Hopples no bar.
